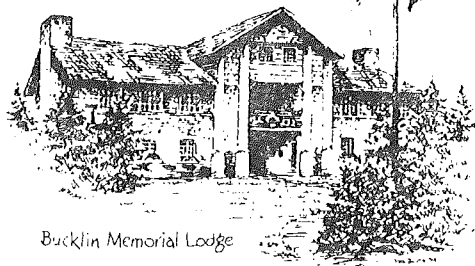

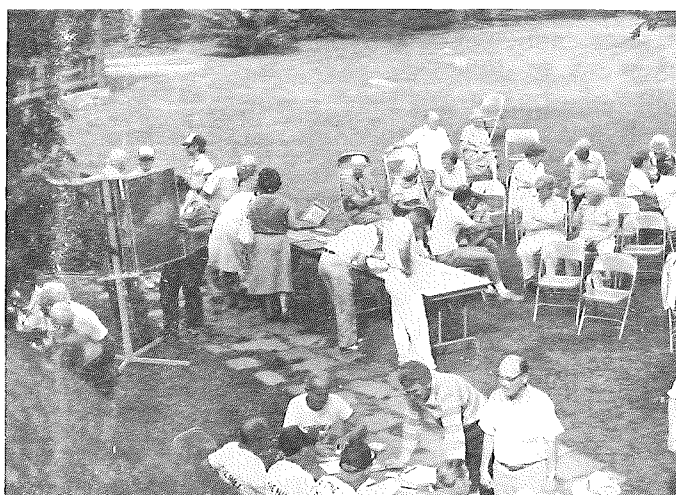
Dear Alumni:

Yes, this was an anniversary year. The Boy Scouts of America celebrated their 75th Birthday; Yawgoog Scout Reservation celebrated its 70th Season; and the Yawgoog Alumni Association came in third with its Fifth Annual Reunion.

Probably the most interesting items were the first showing of the Memorabilia of the History of Yawgoog. There were table displays as well as the newly purchased, 24 page, self-standing display. Each page measures 24" x 36" and contains a different subject: -- Waterfronts, Famous Visitors, Dress Parades, Famous Individuals (like "Chief", Uncle Brad, Al Murray and even me!), Maps, etc.

A review of our three major Special Projects was given and a very encouraging Financial Statement (see inside copies). Our greatest need is to get the names and addresses of the thousands who have attended Yawgoog over the last 70 years. Won't you help? Send in names with addresses.

AT THE 1985 REUNION

At the end of the day, all the Alumni present received a "dummy" copy of Gus's updating of "Chief" Williams The Yawgoog Story. "Chief" took the story from the beginning in 1911 and carried it through fifty years, ending in 1965. Gus has picked it up and carried it from 1965 to 1985. This will be printed and distributed without charge to those members of the Alumni Association who pay their 1986 membership dues of at least the Bronze CY membership of \$10.

REMEMBER: Only paying members of the Alumni Association will receive a free combined copy of "Chief's" Yawgoog Story PLUS "Gus's" update from 1965 to 1985. This combined booklet will also be sent to any new paying members of the Alumni Association.

Eventually, the Council and Camp Yawgoog will have additional copies available through their respective Trading Posts. The cost of the booklet, plus postage, will be around six or seven dollars.

MONEY MATTERS

As there are many questions asked about how the Alumni Association handles the money, let me make these brief statements. The MEMBERSHIP FEES are all invested in the Council's Trust Fund. This money cannot be spent, only the interest on it is expendable and that must be for Yawgoog related items. The SPECIAL PROJECT MONEY is spent on whatever that project is for the year. When a project is completed, any extra designated money is transferred forward to the next project. The BARBEQUE FEE of \$5 pays the camp for the expense of the barbeque, PLUS all the printing, paper, postage and other promotional expenses.

In brief, the only money that can be spent by the Alumni Association is (a) the interest on the invested funds, (b) the money given for special projects, and (c) the "overage" on the barbeque. All these expenditures have to be approved by both the Steering Committee of the Alumni Association and the Council's Committee on Camping.

The Reservation Director annually asks from the Association if we can help meet the expenses of some special needed items of the Camp, which their tight budget does not cover. (For example, we have paid for the cedar shakes to re-shingle the T. Dawson Brown Gateway and the Brown University Drinking Fountain. This year we gave the Camp \$1,000 to clean out the artesian well in Anthony Acres and also to build a latrine, which the RI Health Department requires before this beautiful off-season camping area can be used.) The Camp Committee has, at last, stopped off-season camping on the sites used in the summer season. This does not stop the usage of the four heated cabins, but does stop the use of Adirondacks Shelters that are used in the summer season.

Please see page 4 for a bird's-eye view of our finances for our first 5 years so far. Note that 1986 is not over yet. We run our finances from Reunion to Reunion. If you add the GRAND TOTALS at the bottom of each year, you will see that we have raised a total of \$29,437 and this does not include the interest on the invested funds.

One item on this chart really bothers me. You will note under 1985, we had a grand total of 251 "paying" Alumni. Our mailing list is almost 1,800. This means that only 14% of our Alumni are supporting our efforts. Actually, this means that over 1,500 of you probably have never even acknowledged that you receive our newsletters. I sometimes wonder when our Reunion fees will not be able to keep that number on the "Free-Loader List". We certainly would appreciate your financial support or at least to let us know that our mailings are being received.

If your envelope has a black dot next to your name, it means that we have never even had a post card from you! The letter R with a year following means the year you last attended a reunion. The 1985 reunion attendance is not included.

Besides giving what facts I can remember as I re-read the Annual Camp Reports, I am adding a "Supplement" which will spin some of the interesting memories and anecdotes that I have had at Yawgoog from its beginning. I'm sure you too had some "zingers", so why don't you jot them down and mail them to me for posterity and possible inclusion in this supplement!

GYPSY MOTHS ARE KILLING MANY, MANY OF OUR TREES

We had the terrible forest fire 1931, the devastating hurricane in 1938 and the Gypsy Moths who have hit us the last three years in a row. Many of our oaks have been completely defoliated in spite of state and camp spraying. Even the beautiful Hemlocks serve as their substitute food when the oaks are stripped. We are really watching this coming year and depending on what the state will do, we know that the camp will have to supplement their work. The Alumni is watching this cost factor with hopeful eyes. It may force us to have this as part of our Fourth Project.

HURRICANE "GLORIA" DESTROYS TREES AND WIRES

"Gloria" was a bad girl! She blew over literally hundreds of big trees at Yawgoog as well as on all the other Council properties. Every telephone and electric wire in Yawgoog is down. Many of the poles have to be replaced or reset. "Gloria" damaged only things that were not insured. No building damage and only a few shingles on some of the latrines and an occasional tent platform and tent rail.

It will be really very costly to clear away all the down trees and we hope that we can benefit from some of the lumber from our sturdy (?) white pines that were planted after the 1931 forest fire.

Also, unhappily, the 1985 summer season at Yawgoog showed a loss in enrollment. This financial loss, plus the unknown expenses of cleaning up after "Gloria" may mean that the Alumni Association will again be asked to help.

The next three pages are of interest and then the "News from our Alumni". Why don't you send us some information about yourself so we can know that you at least are getting our newsletters?

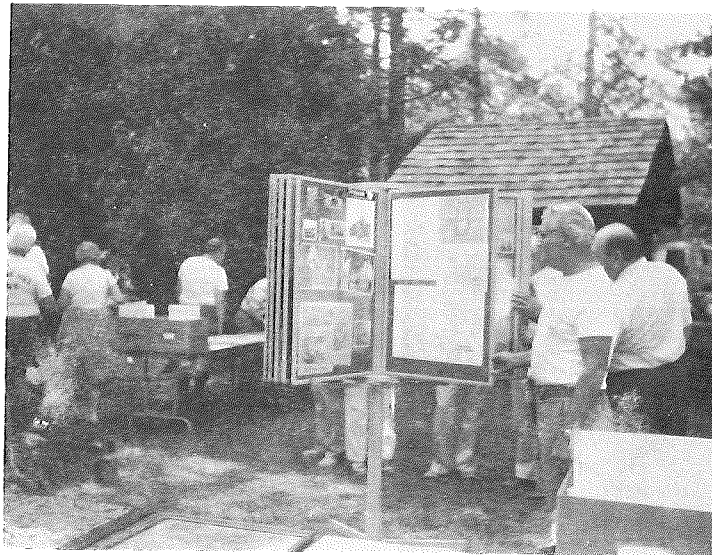
Project III - 1985

"Yawgoog Heritage"

This "Project" has probably been the most difficult and yet the most satisfying of our three projects. Difficult, because we did not know what would come in for "The Museum". Gratifying because what we did get was of most stimulating reading and of great historical interest.

There have been those who thought that we were going to build a Museum Building, but certainly that was only a pipe dream. In light of what we have actually received, a good sized closet would adequately store our 'treasures'. Almost everything received has been of paper: photos, programs, booklets, newspaper stories, you name it and it is paper. We have received very few 'things' to date: a canoe paddle, a leather belt, an oil painting, a beadwork hat band, uniforms, neckerchiefs, patches, insignia and badges. As a result, we think that Yawgoog "Heritage" is more applicable than Yawgoog "Museum".

We have already spent some \$3,000 for the "Heritage Project". This includes a self-standing, 12 page display rack which has been set up under different topics like: Waterfront, Sports, Religious, People, Maps, Hikes, Programs, etc. Besides this, we have about 6 scrap books of everything from the history of Scouting under Catholic auspices to the 1937 Jamboree in Washington. We also gave Yawgoog in 1985 a flat \$1,000 to preserve the soil from erosion in the Curtis Tract by providing water and toilets in Anthony Acres for off-season camping, which is no longer allowed in the campsites used for summer camping. The money you gave for this Project III will be invested in the Council's Trust Fund and earmarked for "the collection, preservation and dissemination of the history of Yawgoog".

PROJECT IV - 1986

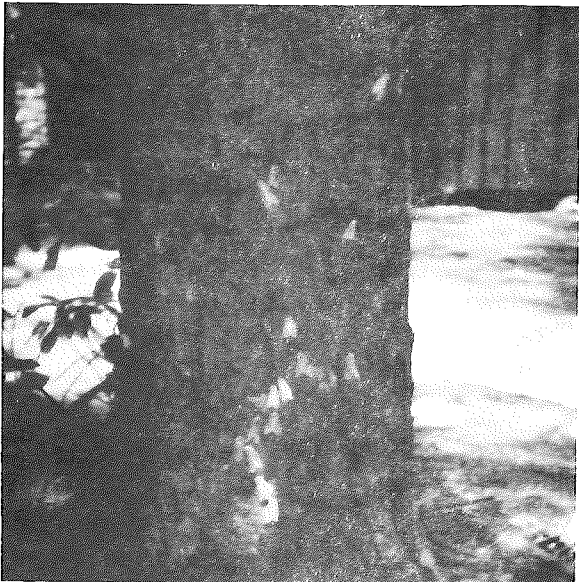
This coming year the Alumni Association feels it should help financially to pay for the "Disasters" of 1985.

Diaster # 1 was hurricane "Gloria". Trees, wires, poles, tent platforms and more were damaged. It is estimated it will cost some \$5,000 to put things back to normal. We should help!

Disaster # 2 has not hit yet but all is ready for the worst year in history for the damage that will be done by the infestation of Gypsy Moths. The egg masses are the greatest ever and every mass has between 700 to 1,000 potential moths to feed on our trees. They have already killed off many hemlocks and some oaks. This year they will be defoliating the trees for the seventh year. We hope the State and our budget will allow us to spray with "Sevin", a lethal chemical. We should help pay their spraying costs which will be about \$120 per acre. Yawgoog should spray at least 500 of our 1,300 acres.
