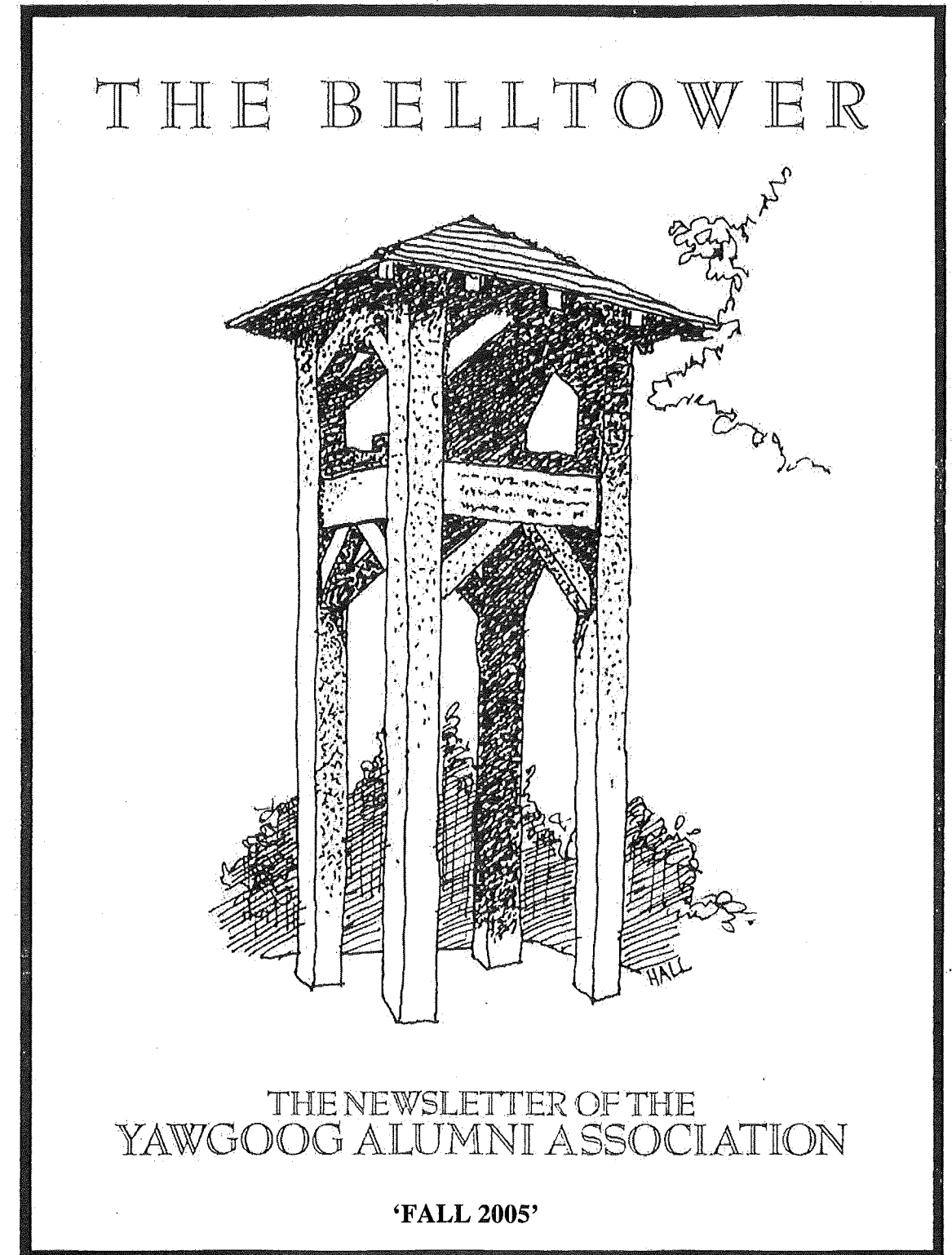

Dear Fellow Alumni:

I had many opportunities to visit Yawgoog this summer and thoroughly enjoyed every visit. My first trip down was during staff week. We decided to hold our June Executive Committee meeting down at camp and made arrangements to dine with the entire staff in the Medicine Bow dining hall. I can unequivocally say the Yawgoog staff spirit was alive and well – not to mention very loud! The energy in the dining hall was amazing and instantly brought me back to my experiences at Yawgoog. The camaraderie and friendly rivalry among the camps were in full swing just a few short days into the season.

My next few visits to Yawgoog revolved around the Heritage Center where we cleaned, sorted and took stock of the displays and storage area in the back room. Some displays were altered and we added a new display case. We filled the new display case with a host of items from the first National Jamboree held in 1937. As many of you may know, the first National Jamboree was originally scheduled for 1935 but was postponed due to a national polio outbreak. Well nearly 70 years later I received a call from our Scout Executive Dave Anderson explaining that they needed to temporarily shut down the camp during the weeks surrounding our reunion due to a viral outbreak. I immediately thought 'What have I done? Had I released some virus lying dormant for 70 years, only to be disturbed when going through the archives?' Well thankfully that plot is reserved for B movies and the X-files.

Unfortunately we could not hold the reunion on July 30<sup>th</sup> as planned. While we discussed the possibility of postponing it until the end of the summer we felt it was best that the staff concentrate on the task of reopening the camp and salvaging the last two weeks. As an organization dedicated to preserving the spirit and heritage of Yawgoog we rightfully decided the scouts come first and we would do everything we could to ensure as many scouts could enjoy the last few weeks.

So it was the reunion that wasn't and years from now will be the subject of a trivia question just like the National Jamboree that wasn't. Who knows, maybe 70 years from now the Alumni will unveil a new display case in honor of the 2005 camping season! Please read on in the newsletter about what we have done and are planning to do thanks to your generosity. We are very excited about our new project to replicate the Chief Williams and Camp Yawgoog Totems, which have flanked the J. Harold Williams Amphitheater stage. While we were not able to formally dedicate the three sailboats we funded, they were there all season for the scouts to enjoy! And although we were unable to be at camp in body on July 30th, I know we are always there in spirit.

Thank you all for your support of the Yawgoog Alumni Association and Camp Yawgoog.

It makes perfect sense to me to change the content of 'Gus's Gossip' to include 'Gossip' from those of you who were *there* from 1916 to Present. By *there*, I mean Yawgoog – stories from those of you who 'camped, worked and played at Yawgoog'. This seems to me to be the best way to continue to put into writing 'The History of Yawgoog'.

We are beginning this new 'trend' of Gus's Gossip with stories from Phil Tracy, a former Yawgoog staffer, Narragansett Council DE and Director of Camping who for many years worked and lived at Yawgoog during the summer camping season.

Here is Phil's first story.

*"Thunderstorms, for many at Yawgoog, were the first time experiencing nature's power without a roof over their head. Sitting in a tent, or an Adirondack, watching the storm come across the lake, can be frightening for the neophyte, and thrilling for the experienced Yawgoog weather veteran. Of course, the waterfront sites had a front row seat to the flashes of lightening, often striking the surface of the lake. It always appeared that the thunderous booms were so much louder then when at home. On one such evening, a particularly strong storm had swept in from the west. Living on the north side of the lake, my children and I were watching the storms approach from the front porch. When it hit, all of us shook a bit. This was a very powerful storm. A few minutes after the storm had struck, my radio crackled with a message from the office in the Bucklin. 'You need to get to the Health Lodge as quickly as possible. Some adults and Scouts were hit by lightening at Dewing site'. I immediately left picking up the camp doctor on the way. When we arrived, there were five Scouts and two leaders on the beds and a stretcher. That week's physician was a nephrologist from Rhode Island Hospital and a veteran Yawgoog doctor. He had seen a lot but never anything like this. The boys and one adult were shaken but doing fine. The Scoutmaster had been hit quite hard and he had no feelings in his lower left leg. His leg was blue. The doctor assumed that the jolt had directly hit the Scouter and caused severe damage to his leg. He quickly got on the phone and talked with emergency room doctors at Rhode Island Hospital. He immediately took action and within a few minutes, the Scouter's leg started to warm and turn pink. Thank God! By then, the boys were heroes. The lacings and stitching in their shoes and boots had been burned away and they were left with soles and tops disconnected. The socks of several had multiple holes burned in them. I offered to replace them with new but they all refused wanting to keep these items for their own box of memories. When investigating the site, it appeared that lightening had hit a tree next to the leader's tent, bounced off the ground and came up through the bottom of the tent platform blasting away boards in the process. Some of the Scouts had gathered there with their leaders to witness the lightening display. After thoroughly checking all the Scouts and the Scouters, the doctor released them to their campsite with the caveat that 'if anything strange happens, come back right away'. Other than the memories, by morning, everything was back to normal. As soon as everyone was declared 'fit for duty', I went to the office to call parents and families. I carefully wrote and rehearsed what I was to say so as not to alarm, but I can't say that there were any parents, or families, that took this lightly. 'Hi, this is Phil Tracy calling from Yawgoog Scout Reservation. Your son is perfectly fine but I wanted you to know that he was in a tent with his leaders when they were struck by lightening. He has been checked by our doctor and is unharmed.' Despite my attempts to assure the parents, they were all at the camp the next morning to make sure. A memorable night, a terrible fright for many, but thank God, no one was seriously injured."*

## GUS'S GOSSIP – CONTINUED

Another 'storm' hits Yawgoog, by Phil Tracy.

"It was, I believe, 1978 and one month before Yawgoog was to open. We had moved all of our summer things to the director's cabin. Tom, Trish and Lori were anxious to move back to camp but we had a weekend retreat to attend so had to put the move off until Monday. Sunday night, there was a very powerful thunderstorm with extremely heavy rain. On Monday morning about 5 a.m., the phone rang. It was Al Gunther. 'Phil, your cabin was struck by lightening. You need to come over right away.' On the way to camp, I thought about what kind of damage could have occurred knowing that Al and the crew could fix anything so not to worry. I was not prepared for what I saw. The cabin was no longer there. The shell of the refrigerator was the tallest thing still standing. The fire marshal arrived shortly thereafter and Al and I walked around the ashes looking for signs of what had happened. I noticed a fist-sized mass of shiny metal and asked the fire marshal what it could be. He told us that it was what remained of the TV antenna. As I recall, he said that aluminum melts at 1600 degrees, so, 'you can judge how hot this fire was'. He also pointed out contiguous squares of white material telling us that it was what remained of the windows; the wood in the windows burned but the putty did not. Later he pointed out the path that the bolt of lightening had taken, 'hitting that pole over there, riding along the wire then in to the electrical panel.' Thank God we weren't there. The insurance company immediately moved a trailer in, our home for the summer. The decision was made that the cabin would be replaced with a log cabin. C.M. Allaire Log Builders were commissioned to put up the logs and Al and the crew did the rest. It was a beautiful cabin but really lacked the history and character of the old one."

## YAWGOOG HERITAGE CENTER FROM THE ARCHIVES...

Did you know Yawgoog had its own newspaper? Not a monthly or weekly but a daily called Yawgoog Daily News. It started in 1927. It wasn't big. Just two sides of a legal piece of paper. But it had many characteristics of a regular daily newspaper. It had a subscription price. In 1928 it was 10 cents a week in camp, 18 cents a week for delivery home. Some even had advertisements on the back page. It even had color. The top heading was in red as were the advertisements on the back.

The oldest one we have on record is from July 15, 1928. It was volume 2, number 15. Here are some excerpts:



### DISTINGUISHED VISITORS THURSDAY

On Thursday afternoon, the camp will have two distinguished visitors, Col. Thomas Denny who is Chief Commissioner of Manhattan New York Boy Scouts, and former United States Senator Newberry. Col. Denny has a force of 20 commissioners under him which supervise over 10,000 Scouts. These men are visiting Watch Hill at the present time.

### LAWRENCE UNDER WIND

For the first time this year, the camp sailboat, the Lawrence, was put in front of the wind and under the able guidance of the salty sailors, "Commodore" Louis Roehr and Ray Wescott tried her skill and gracefully cut the water in Yawgoog pond yesterday afternoon and this morning. The sailors say she rides wonderfully.

Here are some excerpts from July 22, 1928. It was volume 2, number 21.

Sid Silverman of Sandy Beach started off his career as Assistant Cook of the veterans by burning the beans this morning.

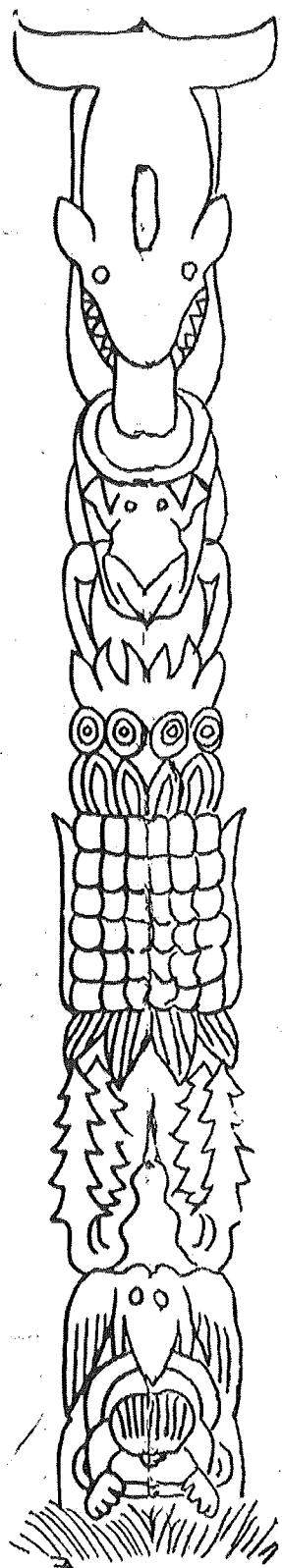
### SANDY BEACH MEN SETTLE

Hidden over in the wilds of Sandy Beach; braving dangers and so forth, live the hardy and robust veterans and pioneers under the able direction of Art Leidman and "Commodore" Louis Roehr... 19 or more boys are there, living in Indian teepees learning by experience more and more about Nature and her secrets. The mess tent is up, the tables are installed, 6 teepees have been erected in circular form, and the campers live in these, sleeping on cots... The campers there are all happy as larks and arise each morning ready for work and breakfast.

The last one we have in the archives is from Saturday, August 31, 1935 – Volume 7, Number 24. By now the paper was known as Yawgoog News. This issue covered the final Scout's Parade of the season and the Circus. These papers provide a valuable historical record of the history of Yawgoog. ## Renewal **CHIEF WILLIAMS AND TOTEM**



Chief Williams Totem

**WASKEKE (The Whale)**  
The Whale was Chief's totem, which he adopted in 1940, when Troop 36 Providence started him to write "The Log of a Whale". It symbolizes his journeys and spoutings.

**WEEMAT (Tongue)**  
This tells of Chief's gift in speaking and storytelling.

**WEQUANANTASH-HUPUONCK (Campfire)**  
Around the campfire, surrounded by scouts and leaders, Chief always was happiest, for there friendship and comradeship are at their best.

**NOKEHICK (Parched Corn)**  
Chief always loved to cook, especially in the outdoors. Rhode Island jonneycakes were his specialty. He got his first job as camp director and cook in 1914.

**YO CUMMITTAMAYON (There Is The Way)**  
Chief was always a hiker and loved the trails of Yawgoog and the roads of South County. His shoes carried him into many states and many lands.

**KAUKONT TUOCK (The Raven)**  
This ancient bird symbolizes Chief's more than 42 years of leadership at Yawgoog and represents the knowledge and abilities which he learned from his guides and mentors and from those with whom he worked during these fruitful and productive years.

Many years have passed since these two beautiful and meaningful totem poles have graced the stage of Camp Yawgoog's Williams Amphitheater.

Originally created by members of Post 22 Providence in 1961, these totems - recalling the life of Chief J. Harold Williams and the history of the Yawgoog Scout Reservation - have long since crumbled into dust due to the fragility of the native materials used verses our harsh New England winters.

Your Yawgoog Alumni Association has recently designated the renewal of these totems as its next official project. This restoration is an important part of our mission to preserve and pass on the heritage of our beloved camp for the next generations of scouts.

Plans for the new totems include a combination of more exotic materials and space-age finishing and treatments in order to insure their durability for many years to come.

## Of The **CAMP YAWGOOG POLES**

The new totems will be more lightweight, enabling out-of-doors display for the summer camping season and then moved into the new Yawgoog Heritage Center for exhibit during the off-season.

Our challenge in creating these new works of art is to obtain non-native durable materials, and to commission a professional artist to bring them to life.

In past years, the membership of the Alumni Association has supported our heritage projects most generously, and I am very confident that you will once again lend your much-appreciated assistance to this project.

This is the symbol of our Country and the guardian of our Camp and all its Scouts and Leaders. The Eagle also represents our high ideals and high aims in life.

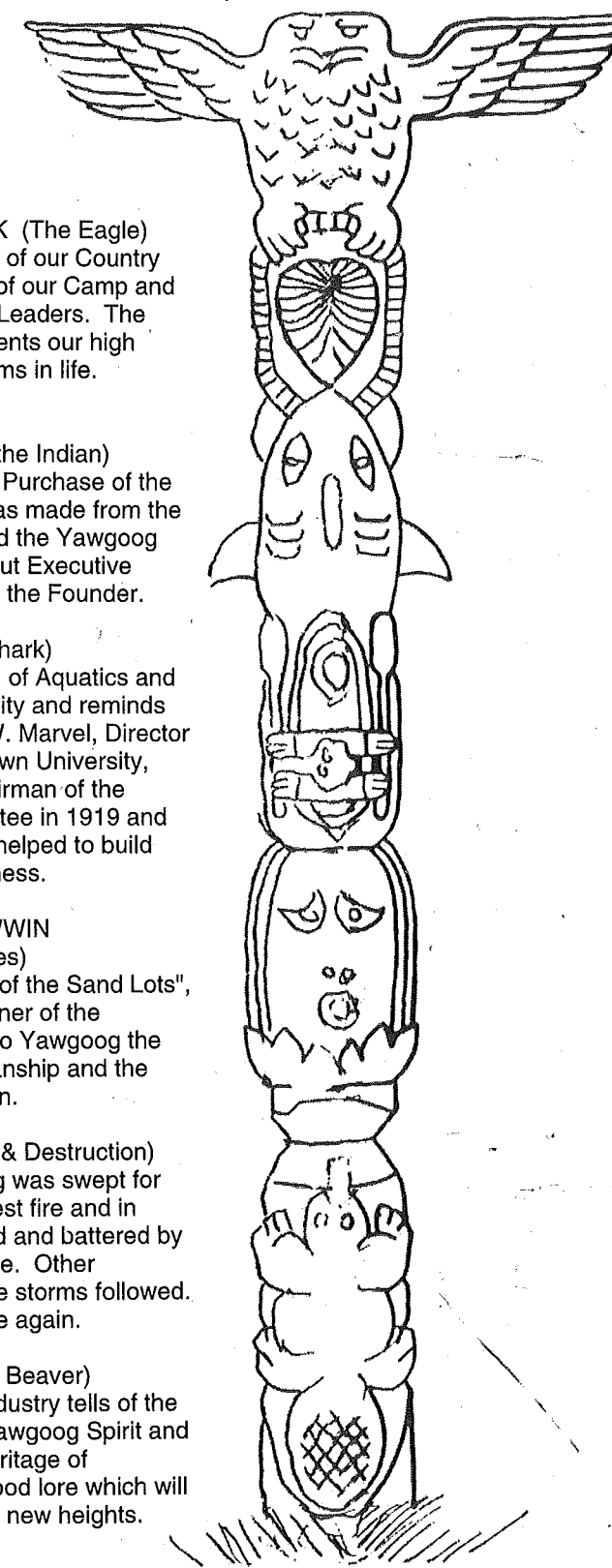
**WAMPUM (The Currency of the Indian)**  
In 1916 the Great Purchase of the Yawgoog Land was made from the Palmer Family and the Yawgoog Story began. Scout Executive Donald North was the Founder.

**NAMAUS (The Shark)**  
This is the symbol of Aquatics and Strength and Vitality and reminds us of Prof. Fred W. Marvel, Director of Athletics at Brown University, who became Chairman of the Yawgoog Committee in 1919 and who for 20 years helped to build Yawgoog's greatness.

**PAUOCHAUTOWWIN (Sports and Games)**  
Tim O'Neil, "King of the Sand Lots", Scout Commissioner of the Council, brought to Yawgoog the Spirit of Sportsmanship and the love of competition.

**YOTAANIT (Fire & Destruction)**  
In 1930, Yawgoog was swept for three days by forest fire and in 1938 was crushed and battered by the great hurricane. Other hurricanes and ice storms followed. But Yawgoog rose again.

**TUMMOCK (The Beaver)**  
The Symbol of Industry tells of the unconquerable Yawgoog Spirit and of the Pioneer Heritage of adventure and wood lore which will carry Yawgoog to new heights.

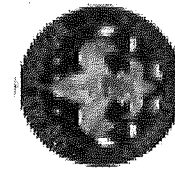
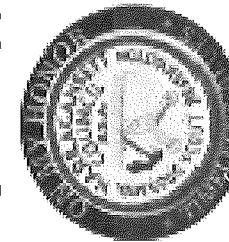

**RUDOLPH, Rudy** (Las Vegas, NV) 1950 – I will never forget my times at Yawgoog. I made Eagle there in 1952.

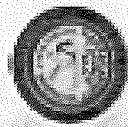

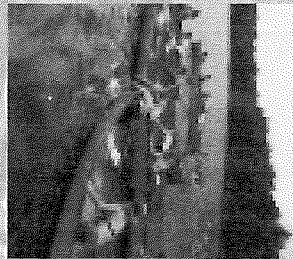

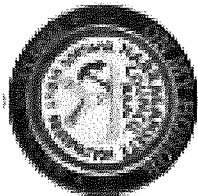


Camp Yawgoog
