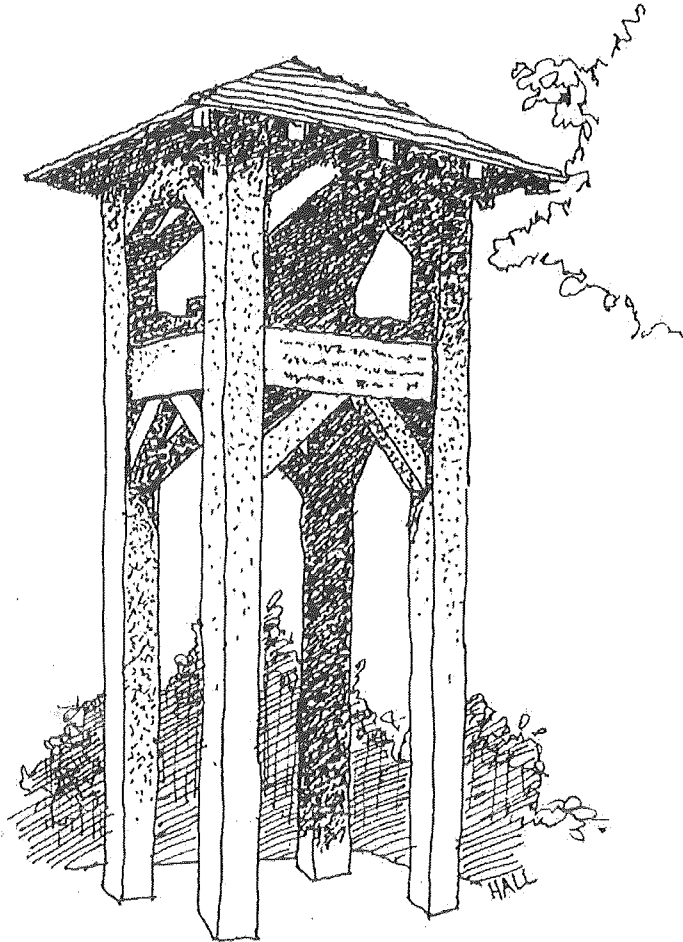
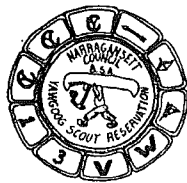

Reunion 2007 - New Totem Poles Receive Rave Reviews!!!

Veteran Scoutmaster Gene D'Ovidio, Sr. Honored

The Yawgoog Alumni Association gathered at camp on August 4th for our annual reunion. We were blessed with a fine day, weather-wise, and spirits were running high. From their temporary home in front of the Heritage Center, the brand new Chief Williams and Camp Yawgoog totem poles dominated Donald North Court. It wasn't long before the D'Ovidio family began to arrive; they came in force to witness the dedication of the Camp Yawgoog totem in memory of Gene D'Ovidio, Sr., longtime Scoutmaster of Troop 1 Greenwood.

As always, our members spent a good deal of the afternoon greeting old friends and "catching up." Some took advantage of the bus tour and personally inspected Yawgoog. Others made their way to one of the three waterfronts to watch a Saturday afternoon water carnival. Many visited the Heritage Center and enjoyed the myriad exhibits of Boy Scout and Yawgoog memorabilia. Everyone seemed to make time to admire the new totem poles and study the explanations of the various totems.

Later on, our Chairman, Steve Dolan, called us together to officially dedicate the two new totem poles. Steve reminded all present that these totem poles are actually the third pair to be created in a tradition going back to 1961. One tells the story of Chief J. Harold Williams; the other tells the story of Camp Yawgoog. Steve singled out two individuals who played key roles in bringing this project to fruition: Andy Krueger, the project coordinator, and Alan Fontana, the artist who carved the totems. Next, he thanked all the individual alumni who contributed to the totem pole project.

Steve then asked Gene D'Ovidio, Jr. to come forward. Gene formally presented the Camp Yawgoog totem to the camp in memory of his father, Gene D'Ovidio, Sr., who served for many years as Scoutmaster of Troop 1 Greenwood and loved Yawgoog dearly.

Following the dedication ceremony, we posed for the traditional decade photos, and then sat down to enjoy an incredible chicken barbecue dinner prepared by the Campmasters and members of the Yawgoog staff. After dinner, Steve Dolan conducted a brief business meeting at which he reminded us that the Alumni Association's next project will be the refurbishment of the three camp amphitheatres, all of which are in need of attention. Finally, on behalf of the Executive Committee, Steve thanked all those who contributed their time and effort to making this year's reunion a success.

Before leaving camp, I decided to walk over to the T. Dawson Brown gate, and take another look at the six magnificent animal totems that we dedicated in 2006. They now proudly guard the camp entrance. They were also made possible through the leadership of Andy Krueger, the artistry of Alan Fontana, and the unflagging financial support of our members. This is definitely a winning combination!

FROM THE ARCHIVES...

As each year passes by I find myself inching ever so close to the ranks of Yawgoog's 'old guard'. There was a time when I was the relatively new kid on the alumni block. I remember talking with Gus Anthony and various others of what I thought was the Jurassic era about the old days in the 1920's, 30's and through the 40's and Scouts and Alumni Executive Committee members from the 1950's and 60's, like Joe Herbold and Bruce Ingham, about the times that were, in my eyes, just slightly out of the pre-historic age. Well, I recently realized time has caught up with me when I was invited to my son's den meeting to help the Cub Scout Bears with one of their requirements. I thought great, what would it be.... knot tying, fire starting? Nope, the requirement was 'find someone who was a Cub Scout a long time ago. Talk with him about what Cub Scouting was like then.' There was even pictures of dinosaurs in that chapter! This led me to an article in The Providence Sunday Journal, written on February 4, 1940 entitled 'The Composite Camper at Yawgoog'. This article, written by Chief J. Harold Williams, was looking back at the then 25 year history of Yawgoog. The following are some excerpts:

- You mention the name Camp Yawgoog to any group of young men in the State of Rhode Island and almost always one of them will exclaim, "Yawgoog?" Sure. Swell place. I camped at Yawgoog when I was a kid."
- There are thousands of old Boy Scouts scattered through these Plantations who have a very warm place in their hearts for the "old camp." And Yawgoog is getting to be an old camp, because this year it celebrates its "Silver Jubilee" – its 25th summer camping season.
- The sons of the first campers have begun to show up at Yawgoog. They see a camp vastly different from the camp their dads saw. The first Scouts in 1916 found a half dozen tents and an outdoor kitchen in the middle of a rocky field. The Scouts in 1940 will find a reservation of 800 acres of land and water completely surrounding Yawgoog Pond, 15 rustic lodges and cabins and 20 separate camps, each the size of the original camp in 1916.
- One Sunday last summer, as a thousand visitors were swarming through the reservation, a man stood looking at the beautiful Bucklin Memorial Lodge which is now the camp headquarters. With him were his wife and three sons. He looked perplexed. "Why, I camped here the first year, but I don't recognize it at all," he said. Then he added sadly, "Camp isn't what it used to be." That's the way it is with each generation. Camp isn't what it used to be – OR EVER WAS. Yawgoog is best as the old Scout remembers it in his day. One may remember the circle of tents and the old mess shack of 1919. Another remembers Louie Gavitt and his famous sea stories told in the barn in 1923. Some say that 1927, with Dan Lamb's tepee camp and "Doc" Gregory's ukulele, was the big year." You should have seen camp when Rathom Lodge was built in 1929." "Yes, but we had the fun when Ray Wescott had that burro, Saxophone, up at Fort Hilton and when Kenny Scott was director at Three Point in 1932." "But mister", says the Tenderfoot Scout today, "you ought to see the swell waterfront at Sandy Beach, and Prof. Zook."

Yawgoog may have grown large, but it has never lost sight of the individual boy.

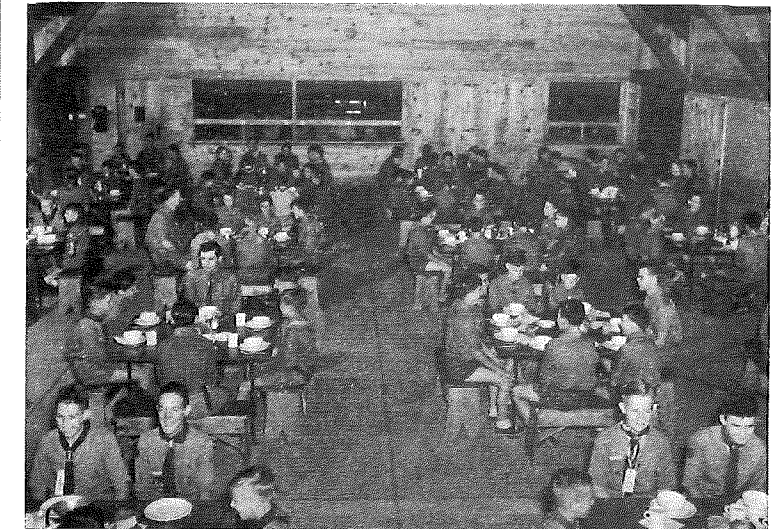
So when I find myself waxing nostalgic, I try to catch myself before I sadly say, "Yawgoog's just not the camp it used to be" (lest I give away my true age) to these Cub Scouts and have them think of me as the 'old Cub Scout'. I remember that it's OK. Yawgoog and even Scouting is certainly different from when I roamed the earth as a Scout, but it still has never lost sight of the individual boy.

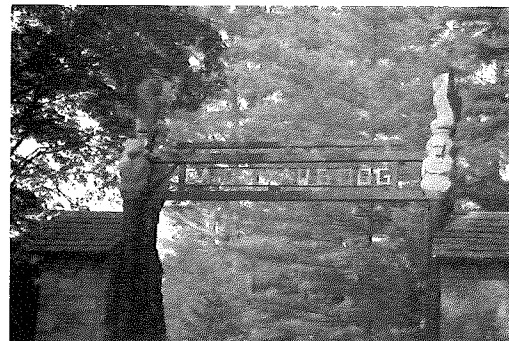

. and FUTURE

For the upcoming year, our original project concept was the refurbishment of the three camp amphitheaters. However, after studying the problems with them, the camp management and the association came to the conclusion that major rebuilding of each one was necessary for erosion control and long-term use of the areas. We have therefore chosen to split this project into three separate pieces, with the goal of rebuilding one each year for the next three years.

In 2008, then, we are planning to rebuild and greatly expand the capacity of the Sandy Beach Amphitheater. This will include terracing of the hill to control erosion, new benches and supports, a redesigned stage area, and some decorative landscaping features. In 2009 and 2010, we will repeat this work at Medicine Bow and Three Point, respectively.

Your generous support of these two new projects is deeply appreciated, and will help assure that "Spirit of Yawgoog" is passed on to those that follow us

GUS'S GOSSIP

A Yawgoog story by Russell J. Hahn

I fell in love with Camp Yawgoog in the 1940's as a Scout in Troop 4 Cranston. My dad was a Yawgoog Scout too in 1919 with J. Harold Williams, Gus Anthony and several boys who later would become notables in the history of Yawgoog as well as Presidents of the Narragansett Council. Dad never forgot his first year at Yawgoog. He got a severe stomachache that resulted in burst appendices. He was rushed to the hospital in Providence where he spent most of the rest of the summer.

Some of the boys who attended Yawgoog with me also became part of the history of Yawgoog. Notably, Al Gunther (Camp Ranger for many years). Al and I were tent mates as first time Yawgoog campers in 1944. We were referred to as "rookies" in those days. Our troop camped at Sandy Beach just to the right of Metcalf Lodge. I knew J. Harold well. The fact is he was a friend to my whole family as a result of my dad's misfortune at Yawgoog. I got to know Gus while a professional in the Council for a short time in the 1960's. And, I well remember Zook Da' Spook, especially at the 1950 National Jamboree at Valley Forge and my summer as mess hall boy at Three Point and going to Boston with Frank Toste and other staffers to see "Death of A Salesman".

While I served as leader or chairman of several scout units in three councils among other positions at district and council level during my Scouting years, (we moved a few times) my most rewarding Scouting experience was at Yawgoog. I had taken over Troop 7 Cranston as SM when it was close to folding in the mid 1970's. The troop camped at Sandy Beach's Kit Carson every year. By my third year as SM, the troop was back up to 32 boys, two were mine. We had new camping equipment, a trailer, custom colors and custom neckerchiefs and an orange teepee, all the result of a supportive troop committee. And, we managed to find uniforms for every boy too!

Knowing I would be busy that first day at camp, I directed the Senior Patrol leader to take the first year Scouts on an orientation hike around the camp and then develop a rousing campfire program for our first night. Songs, skits, cheers etc. with a "reward" for the best skit. I hoped this would keep the boys busy and keep the younger ones mind off home. The time for the campfire arrived, the senior patrol leader had selected a 14 year old as campfire master who had just completed 3 weeks at the Sandy Beach provisional camp. I was surprised because the boy was shy and self-conscious. But, then, the boy took charge. I sat there mesmerized. A self assured young man seemed to rise up out of nowhere. He was a dynamo leading the other boys in songs and cheers. I was stunned. That moment and night is indelibly printed in my mind! It was Scouting's promise fulfilled! Building character and leadership! Three years later the boy, an Eagle Scout by then, received one of 300 competitive principle appointments to the Coast Guard Academy out of over 6,000 applicants. Unfortunately, he couldn't get by the physical. He later received his PhD in EE from Notre Dame and is now married with four Girl Scouts doing well in Minnesota. The campfire master was my son! That was a proud, very special night. I knew from that moment my son was going to be OK. Yawgoog and Scouting played a major role, not only in my son's life, but our whole family.

Hey, Yawgoog campers – this is what I'm talking about! Russ, this is a great story and thanks for sharing it with all of us. Come on Yawgoog Campers, tell us your story too!
