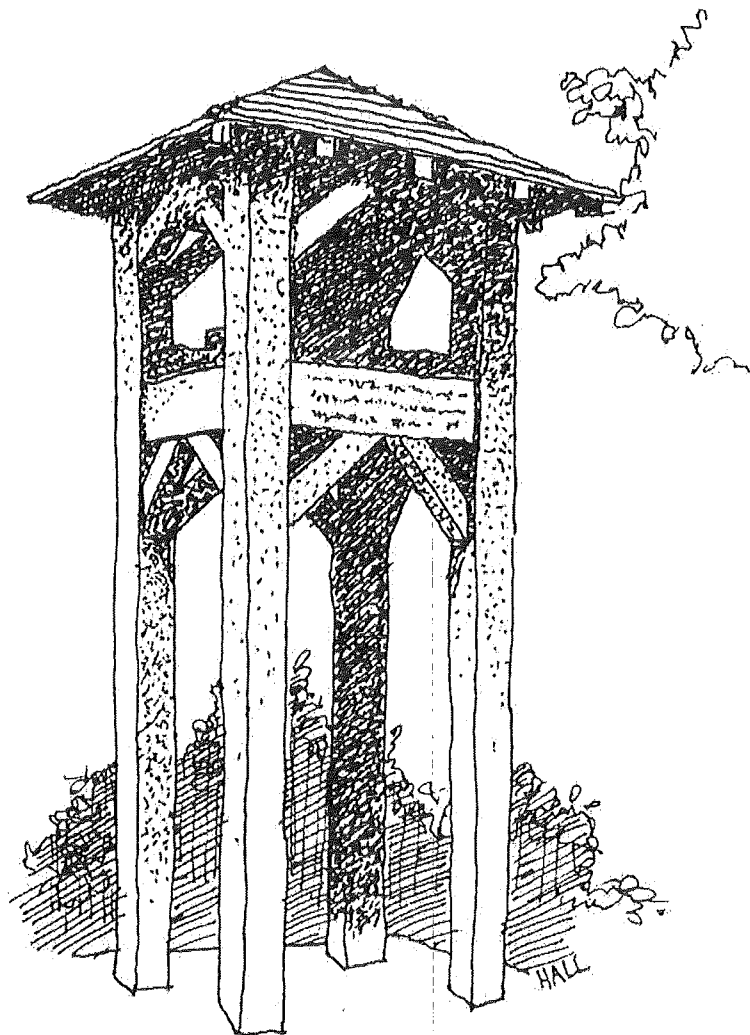
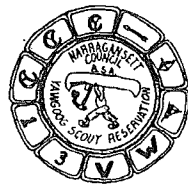

PEOPLE MAKE IT HAPPEN!





GUS'S GOSSIP

A Yawgoog Story by Albert Bruno

In the year of 1943, my first year at Camp Yawgoog, several things happened that I have always remembered. I was 12 years old and was with Troop 1 Esmond at Camp Netop. As this was my 'rookie' year at camp, I was not too familiar with a lot of the rules. As I was swimming in the beginners' pool, I left my 'buddy' in the water to get something at Netop. While on my way back to my camp, a 'count' was taken and I was the missing person! Someone who knew I was new at the camp asked me what I was doing alone during swim time and I gave some answer. At that moment he asked me to go to the Bucklin Memorial and obtain a 'left handed monkey wrench and 50 feet of shoreline' before I could go back to the swimming area. I ran as fast as I could to the Bucklin Memorial and as I was near....all sweaty and pooped....someone stopped me and asked where I was going, what for, and told me to put my shorts down to regular size because I was a 'rookie' and only the veterans were allowed to roll up their pants.

When I returned to the swimming area, I got a tongue lashing for leaving the swim area and was told that what I was told to pick up at the Bucklin Memorial was a trick that they do to 'rookies'. As it turned out, I was stopped BEFORE I got to the Bucklin Memorial and was told that was a big hoax. I returned to the swimming area, was chastised and learned then...I was the missing person who caused the swimming to be stopped. Never left again - a valuable lesson learned. It sounds funny now, but what a day for a 'green' 12 year old.

A Yawgoog Story by R. Malcolm Salter

Peppy (Malcolm L. Daniels) and I were tent mates in 1948. That summer he was the chef at Three Point and I was the apprentice on the TP waterfront. The day I met Peppy he was sitting on the steps to the mess hall with some of the kitchen staff. I was coming up the trail in baggy coveralls and a pith helmet. Peppy asked the others, 'whose this creep?'. When he found out I was his tent mate, we all had a good laugh. The name stuck and for many summers I was called, "The Creeper." Peppy was a disabled vet having been wounded in France. One day changing to go for a swim, I noticed six indentations, each the size of a bullet, inside the thigh of one of his legs. "I was lucky," he said, "that I was hit by a trained gunner." I didn't know what he meant then but when I was drafted into the Army later, I learned that soldiers are trained to fire a machine gun in bursts of six. Peppy said a soldier tied a tourniquet on his leg during the battle and he passed out. He awoke to see a German medic loosening the tourniquet. Peppy lost consciousness again. He awoke to German voices. He thought that he had been captured. Then someone asked, "Hey, G.I. how are we doing here?" He opened his eyes to see a smiling American doctor. Peppy was in a U.S. forward field hospital with German and allied wounded.

Two years later I was Waterfront Director at Medicine Bow while Bob Phaneuf headed the Stockade and Dave Wilbourn was the Camp Naturalist. (We three and our wives still get together for dinner at least once a year.)

I can still hear Dickie Besso, a summer long camper, saying 'Hey Creeper' as he approached my tent on the MB waterfront. His parents wanted him to finish his requirements for Eagle and all he lacked was swimming and lifesaving merit badges. He completed swimming fairly quickly but life saving was another matter. A childhood sickness had left him with weak legs. All the BSA 'approved' carries required strong kicking motions while the hands and arms supported the victim. Dickie just didn't have the leg power to keep his victim afloat while towing him to shore. I knew the Eagle Board wasn't going to do testing in the water and would rely on my signature that he had met all the requirements. During the last week I said to Dickie, "Rescue Mac (my assistant) and bring him in any way you can but keep his head out of the water. To my surprise, Dickie wrapped his legs around Mac's chest and flapped those powerful arms. Mac's head and shoulders were out of the water all the way to shore. I saw what persistence, flexibility and determination can do. Eagle Scout Dickie was my instructor that summer.

A Request from Dick Zimmermann – Please read Dick's story and let us know if you know any of the soldiers!

During the battle for the highly defended Omaha Beach in the Normandy, France, invasion on the 6th of June, 1944, our ship (the U.S.S. Frankford D.D. 497) was busy destroying each German fortification. We were parallel to the beach so the maximum number of guns could fire on the enemy. At about noon, people were being relieved to get something to eat even as the firing continued. On the opposite side of the ship, a landing craft which had just landed its troops came alongside asking for immediate emergency help for one of the soldiers who was wounded. The landing craft was on its way to major medical facilities just over the horizon. The cocks wan asked if we would take a seriously injured man to our doctor to see if he could save his life as well as help the others. The cocks wan believed if the wounded man was not helped he would die before his boat could arrive at the assigned medical ship. Immediately he was taken aboard along with the other wounded men whose wounds could be better treated by a doctor than at the first aid station ashore. The ship's ward room was the major battle dressing station aboard our ship. The dining room table became the operating table and all chairs were pushed against the sides of the ward room. High powered lights in the ceiling helped illuminate the operations. Our Captain always ceased fire when the doctor requested it for delicate procedures. We received word later that the wounded man survived and the doctor said he would have full use of his leg again.

A small buffet table provided meals for the officers and those who were wounded. When I arrived during my break from battle, I took my lunch and sat by a wounded soldier who had lost part of his hand. He was eating lunch and cradling his plate with the arm of his wounded hand while eating with the other. We talked in between the Gun Salvos as we ate and found out that he too was a Yawgoog veteran. You never know where you are going to meet another Yawgoog veteran! These are the five men we treated – does anyone recognize the name of the soldier I talked with?

IN MEMORY, ROBERT E. GORDON, SR. – MARCH 17, 2008

Bob was a longtime friend and supporter of Camp Yawgoog. An original member of the Yawgoog Fire Department, he always 'did his best' to help others. He helped build and finish the addition to the workshop that would house the Yawgoog fire trucks.

A lifelong resident of Rockville, Bob was also an Assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 1 Yawgoog, sponsored by the Yawgoog Fire Department. Many local boys including his sons made Yawgoog their Scouting home. The troop meetings were held in the Bucklin Memorial Room, with Al Gunther serving as Scoutmaster. Their picture is proudly displayed in the Yawgoog Story.

Bob was a very close friend of Al Gunther, former Yawgoog Ranger, and the pair was a fixture in the Hope Valley Ambulance Squad for over 20 years. During their duty nights, the ambulance was housed at Yawgoog and Al would pick Bob up on the way to the call. Al and Bob secured and arranged the purchase of 258 acres surrounding Grassy Pond. The spectacular piece of land had been in the Gordon Family for generations. How lucky we are to have it.

Bob's final resting place, 'in a nice sunny spot,' as he would describe it, is only a few feet from the graves of Yawgoog's first Ranger Inkey Armstrong and his family in the Rockville Cemetery. Al Gunther summed it up nicely at Bob's funeral when he said, 'although Bob is gone, his memory and legacy live on through his family'. For us at Yawgoog, Bob's work will live on each time a Scout hikes along the trails of the 'Gordon' property.
